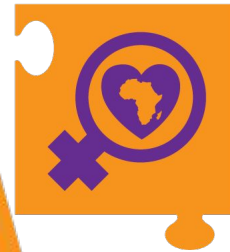

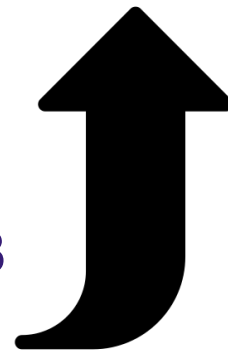

Who is connected where ?

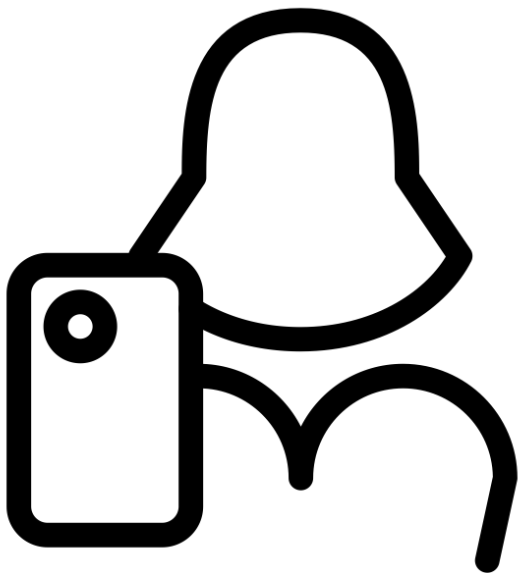


4.1 billion people or 53% of all people are online (2019).

**Up 5.3%

Who was connected where in 2019/20?



93% of people had access to a mobile network.

In Least Developed Countries
80% of the population was offline

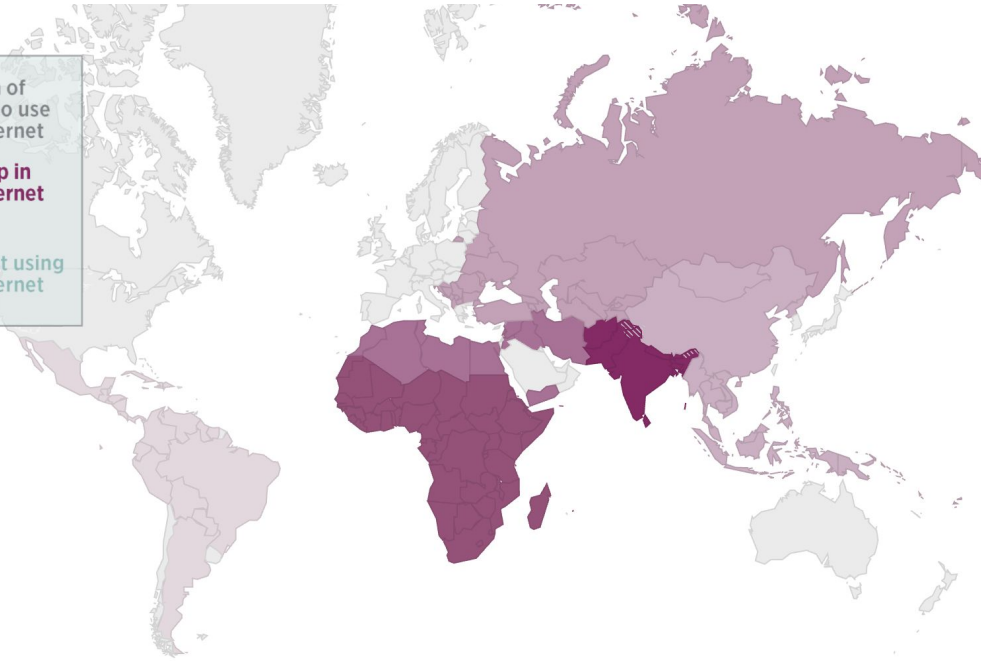
In Africa ...

was at 39.3 % (the world's lowest)

23% of the population do NOT have
access to a mobile network.

Gender gap in mobile internet use

OVERALL

- 54% Proportion of women who use mobile internet
- 20% Gender gap in mobile internet use
- 1bn Women not using mobile internet

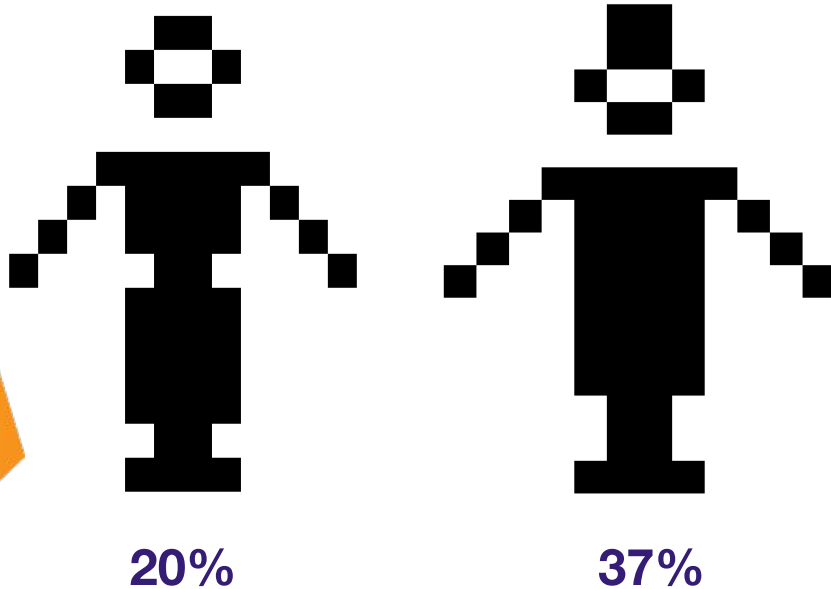

Globally, 48% of all women use the Internet to 55% of all men.

1 billion women do not use the internet

In Africa, the internet penetration rate drops to 37% for men and **20% for women**

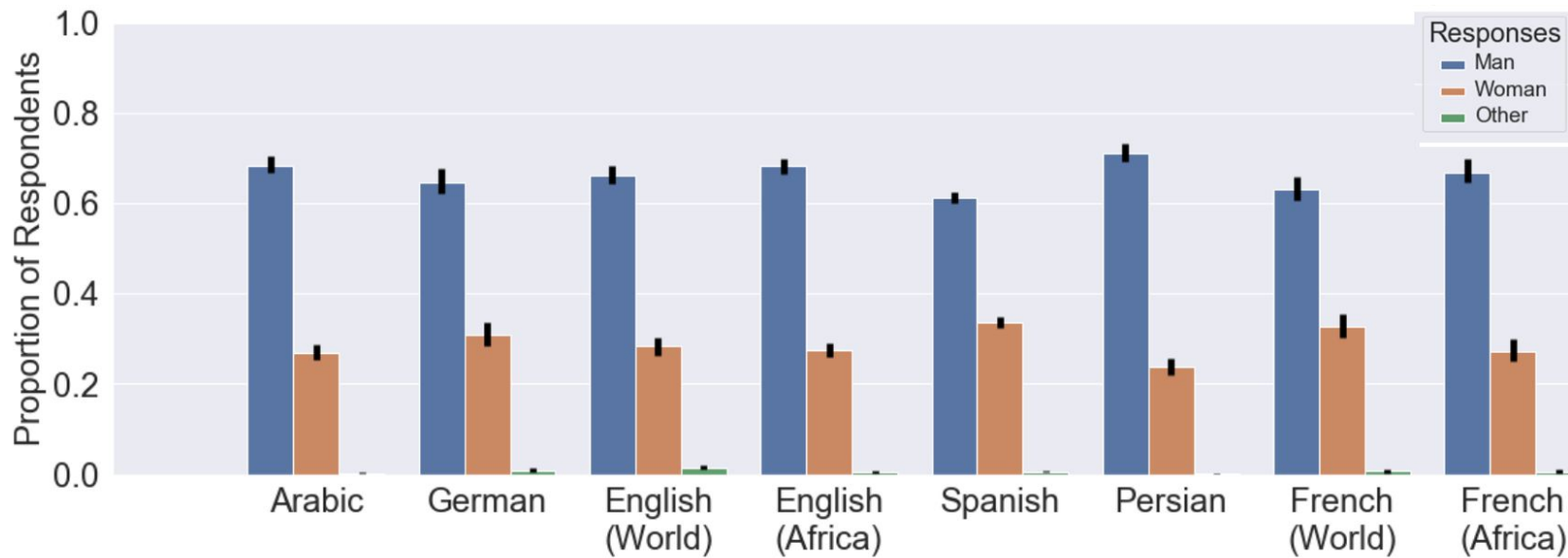

Gender Gap: Readers

Men more likely to read Wikipedia than women





Gender Gap: Readers

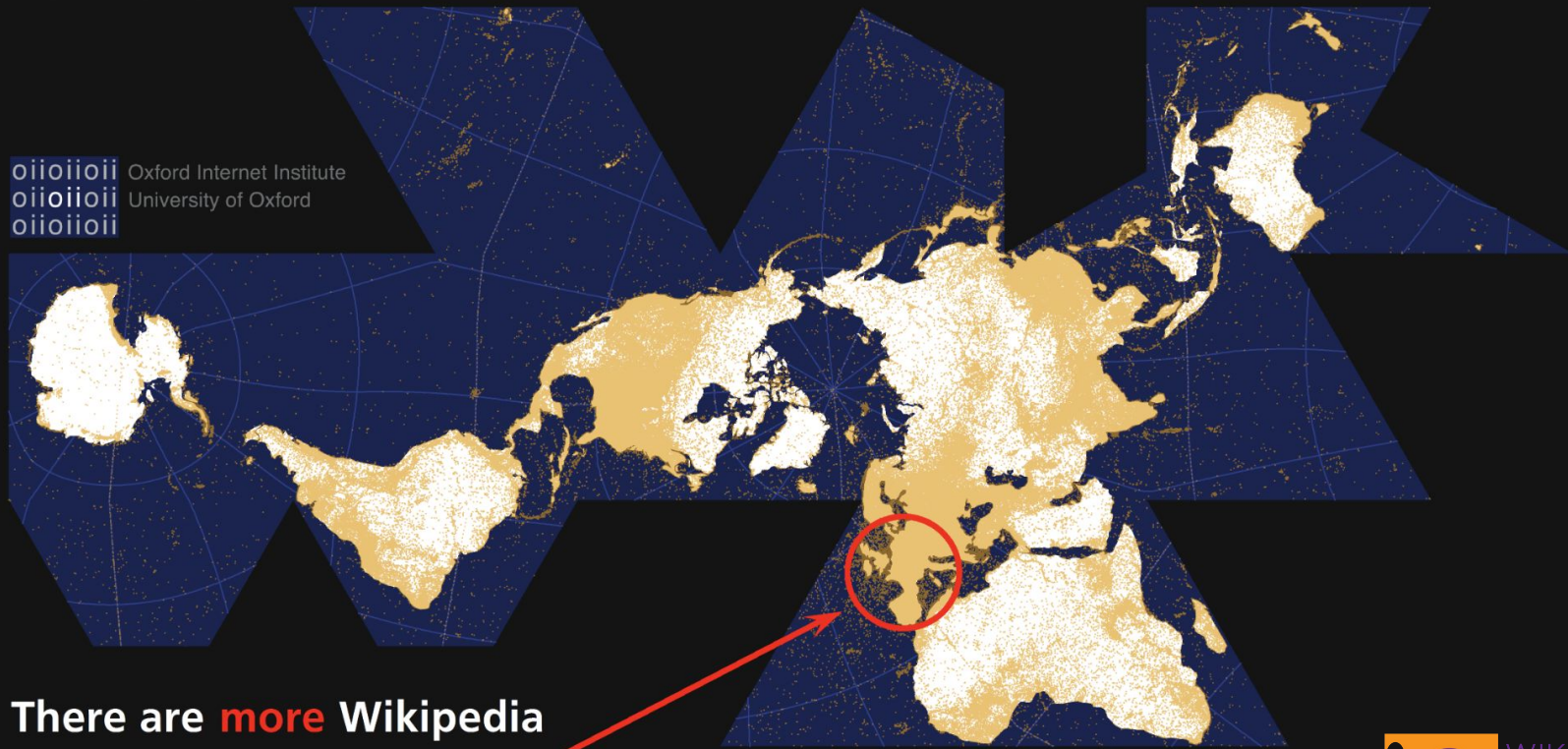
- Women view fewer pages per reading session than men do
 - men = 67% of readers
 - men generate around 72% of pageviews on any given day
- Men and women visit Wikipedia for similar reasons
- Men and women exhibit specific topical preferences
 - the topics read more consistently by men (e.g., sports or technology)
 - topics that were read more consistently by women (e.g., broadcasting or medicine)



The Geographically Uneven Coverage of Wikipedia

While it is an invaluable resource of knowledge for numerous users, Wikipedia's articles have a strong bias in their geographic distribution. Below map is based on 3,336,473 geotagged articles in November 2012 data dumps of 44 language versions. Each article is represented by an orange dot.

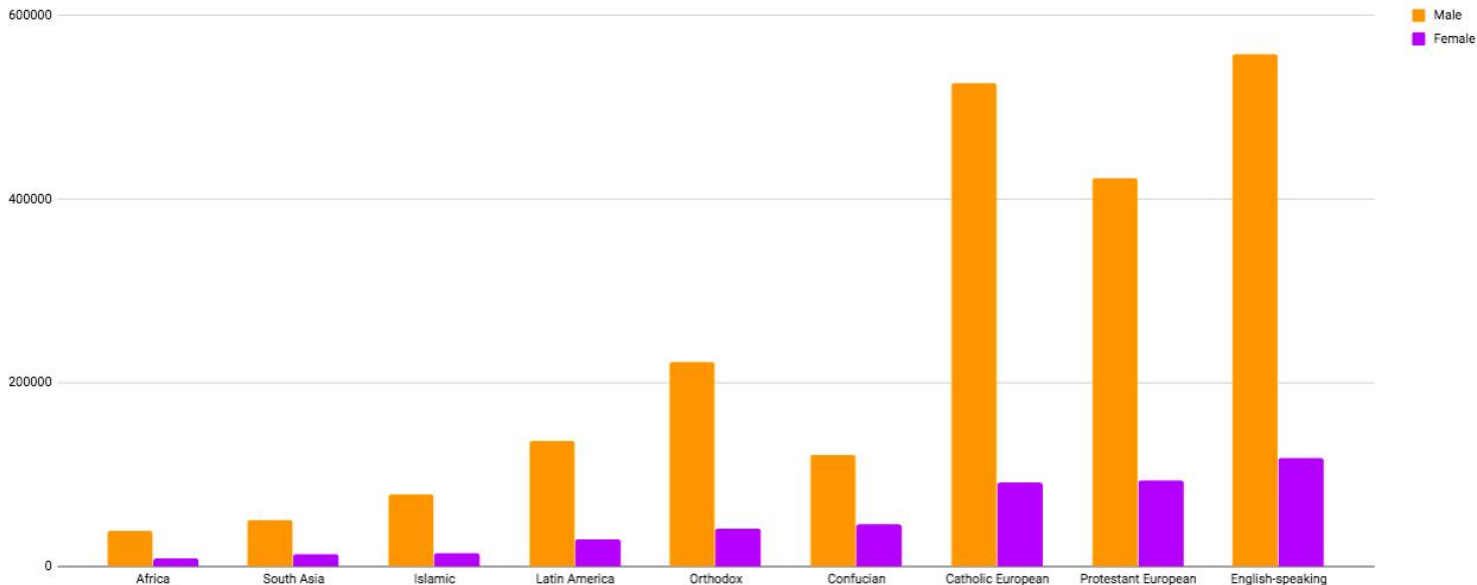

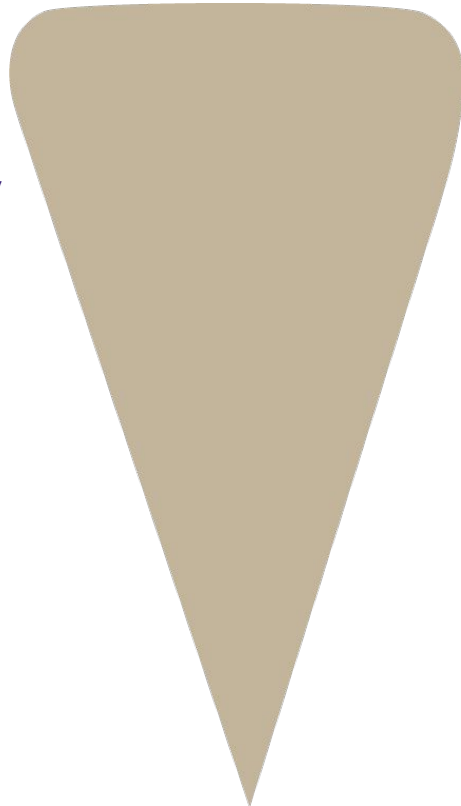

Offline impact:

- 8 participating countries up to 2020.
- 78 partnering organisations
- 123 events held (prior to 2020)
- 46 team members
- 1,501 participants

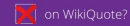

How we have tackled the Gender Gap



- 8 country-focused interventions
- 78 partnering organisations
- 1922+ articles created or edited
- 2081+ photos uploaded, and counting ...
- 123 events held
- 46 members in local teams
- 22 of team female
- 1501 participants
- 42.25% participants female
- Post project, sustained activity in 5 countries
- Allied **Wiki Loves Women** project created in India

6 online global challenges held

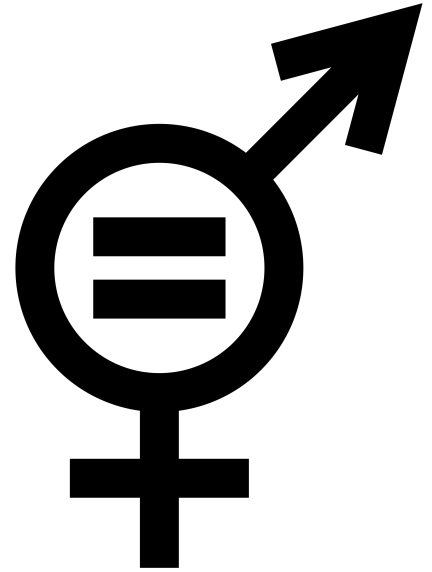
