If a topic has received **significant coverage** in **reliable sources** that are **independent** of the subject, it is **presumed** to be suitable for a stand-alone article or list.

Conflict of interest (COI) editing involves contributing to Wikipedia about yourself, family, friends, clients, employers, or your financial and other relationships.

COI editing is strongly discouraged on Wikipedia.

Editors with a COI, including [paid editors](#), are expected to [disclose it](#) whenever they seek to influence an affected article's content.

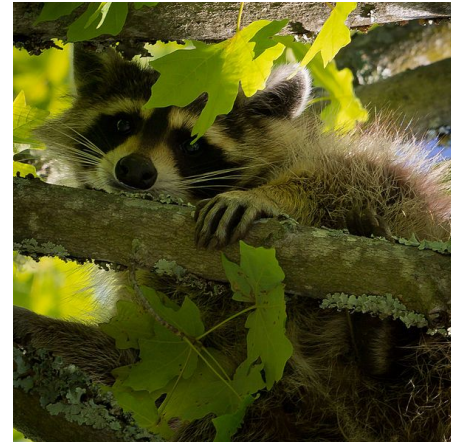

Wikipedia articles should be based on **reliable, published sources**, making sure that **all majority and significant minority views** that have appeared in those sources are covered. If no reliable sources can be found on a topic, **Wikipedia should not have an article on it.**

All encyclopedic content on Wikipedia must be written from a **neutral point of view (NPOV)**, which means representing fairly, proportionately, and, as far as possible, without editorial bias, all of the significant [views](#) that have been [published by reliable sources](#) on a topic.
